Remembering Dave Mason by Cathy Palmer

Border Collie Great, Dave Mason passed on in Stockton at the age of 85. Suffering from macular degeneration, thus low spirits, cancer cut his life short.

David's whole life revolved around horses, bulls, and Border Collies. Raised on a ranch and educated at Cal Poly, David used his knowledge to serve his country in the 698th Quartermaster Company Remount veterinary technician in Central Burma and in the Asiatic Pacific Theater in the early 40's. He earned four medals and a honorable discharge as a Sergeant January 1946.

Next was a life of Bull Riding and Bare Bronc Riding in rodeos across the country. He holds a PRCA Gold Card and is listed as the Bull Riding Champion of the 1952 Lewiston Roundup Rodeo in Idaho. He rode with other rodeo greats such as Casey Tibbs and Jim Shoulders. He told me the best time of his life was in the 50's. He married in 1954 and raised one son and three daughters. He had a couple of



"family raising jobs" and retired from them to start a career of breeding and training Border Collies to herd sheep and cattle. Naturally, he excelled and produced many great dogs; Joe, Molly, Jigs and Ben to name a few.

David took pride in his work and was generous to share his knowledge with others and opened his ranch for a sheep dog clinic. He won many awards in the 80's and 90's.

David, Molly and Ben were featured in a San Jose newspaper

article entitled "Mesmerizing the flock" in the early 90s.

Dave loved being independent. He divorced in 1995. Life wasn't much of a life unless he could do what he loved. His failing eyesight took that from him, and he refused to seek cancer treatment.

Not wanting to be a burden to anybody and insisting on his way, he signed up for hospice June 9th. He passed on near midnight June 23-24 2009.

He has requested no services.


